Countdown To Face Off

- 10 The 2007 season marked the 10th time in school history that Cornell reached the NCAA national semifinals (1971, 74, 75, 76, 77, 78, 82, 87, 88, 2007).
- 9 The three projected starters on attack - Kyle Doctor (3g, 2a), Ryan Hurley (2g, 2a) and Chris Ritchie (0g, 0a) - have combined for nine career points.
- 8 Cornell has posted eight consecutive regular season non-conference victories, dating back to a 12-11 loss to Syracuse during the 2006 season.
- 7 Senior goalie Jake Myers has the most experience with the Big Red of all the goalkeepers on the roster after playing seven minutes for Cornell last season.
- 6 Six members of the Big Red - Pierce Derkac, John Espey, John Decker, Peter Grom, Brad Kamedulski and Matt Sutherland - played on the same high school or prep school team as a member of the Navy squad.
- 5 Cornell's five consecutive regular season Ivy titles is the longest current stretch by any team in any conference, surpassing Navy, which has won at least a share of four straight Patriot League titles.
- 4 Head coach Jeff Tambroni currently ranks fourth in the nation among active Division I coaches in winning percentage, opening the year with a mark of .737.
- 3 Cornell opens the season with three new starters on the attack following the graduation of Henry Bartlett, David Mitchell and Eric Pittard.
- 2 This game will mark just the second meeting between Cornell and Navy since the Big Red's 13-7 victory in the 1978 NCAA national semifinal.
- 1 The game in Uniondale, N.Y. marks the first neutral site game in the history of the Cornell/Navy series.

THE MATCHUP – No. 6/6 Cornell opens the 2008 campaign, the 113th season in the history of the Big Red men's lacrosse program, by taking on No. 12/T10 Navy at the Mitchel Athletic Complex, home of Major League Lacrosse's Long Island Lizards, in Uniondale, N.Y. The game is slated for Saturday, Feb. 23 at 1 p.m., and will be the first between the two teams since the 2004 NCAA quarterfinal game in which the Midshipmen defeated Cornell, 6-5, on Schoellkopf Field. The game in Uniondale will mark the first regular-season game between the Big Red and Navy since the 1975 season. The contest is the season opener for the Cornell, while the Midshipmen enter the game with a 2-0 record after defeating VMI, 10-2, and Ohio State 8-7 in overtime.

THE SERIES VS. NAVY – The Cornell and Navy men's lacrosse teams first met during the 1911 season with the Midshipmen rolling to a 12-0 victory. Navy has won 15 of the 19 meetings between the two squads behind the strength of 13 straight victories to open the series, but the teams met seven times during the 1970s, with Cornell holding the 4-3 advantage during that span. Since Cornell's 13-7 victory in the 1978 NCAA national semifinal, the two teams have met only once, with the Midshipmen defeating Cornell, 6-5, on Schoellkopf Field in the 2004 NCAA quarterfinal.

SCOUTING THE MIDSHIPMEN – Navy, the reigning Patriot League champion, is the preseason favorite to win the 2008 title. The Mids went 11-4 overall and 6-0 in the conference and ended the season as the eighth-ranked team in the nation. Five of Navy's All-Patriot League selections from a season ago are back in action this year, including preseason All-Americans Nick Mirabito, Jordan DiNola, Geoff Leone and Basil Daratsos. So far this season, the Midshipmen are off to a 2-0 record after defeating VMI, 10-2, and Ohio State 8-7 in overtime. Mirabito leads the team with five points (two goals, three assists), while Tim Paul has a team-high five goals. Matt Coughlin has been the goalie of record in both contests, posting an impressive 4.42 goals-against average and a .550 save percentage.

CORNELL VS. THE PATRIOT LEAGUE – The Big Red is 56-54-4 all-time vs. the current members of the Patriot League, thanks mostly to a 38-7-1 record vs. Colgate. Cornell is 10-23-0 all-time vs. Army, 4-9-3 vs. Lehigh, and 4-15-0 vs. Navy. The Big Red has never faced Bucknell, Holy Cross, or Lafayette in men's lacrosse ... Coach Tambroni has posted a 7-2 record vs. the Patriot League with Cornell winning its last four contests vs. PL opponents, dating back to an 11-9 loss to Army at Michie Stadium during the 2005 season.

A WIN TODAY WOULD -

- Be the Big Red's ninth consecutive regular season non-conference victory, dating back to a 12-11 loss to Syracuse during the 2006 season.
- Give Cornell its fifth-straight victory over a Patriot League opponent.
- Even Coach Tambroni's record vs. Navy to 1-1.
- Make Cornell 59-20-5 all-time in season openers and 6-2 during Coach Tambroni's tenure.

CORNELL'S LAST GAME – In what was perhaps the gutsiest performance of the entire 2007 collegiate lacrosse season, the Big Red rallied from a seven-goal deficit with 18 minutes left in its national semifinal contest with Duke and tied the game on a Brian Clayton goal with 17 seconds to play, only to see Duke's Zach Greer score the game-winner with three seconds to go, giving the Blue Devils the 12-11 victory in front of a record-setting crowd of 52,004 spectators at M&T Bank Stadium in Baltimore, Md. David Mitchell scored four goals and Clayton added three as the Big Red clawed back from its worst deficit of the season to tie the game with 17 seconds remaining. Eric Pittard added four assists, giving him 11 for this season's NCAA tournament, and Matt McMonagle made 11 saves in goal for Cornell. Greer scored four goals to lead Duke, while Brad Ross and Ned Crotty added a pair as the Blue Devils advance to the national championship game. Duke goalie Dan Loftus made 16 saves, including eight in the critical second and third quarters, to earn the win for the Blue Devils.

ITHACA, N.Y. — Ian Dingman and Graham Gill both scored two goals, and goaltender Matt Russell made 12 timely saves to lead Navy to the NCAA semifinals with a hard-fought 6-5 win over Cornell.

After a scoreless opening period, Navy tallied the first goal of the game at 4:57 of the second quarter. With the Big Red's Tim DeBlois serving a 30-second penalty for pushing, Gill fired a shot that beat goaltender Matt McMonagle. Cornell rallied with two goals in less than two minutes to take its only lead of the day, 2-1. Sean Greenhalgh tied the contest with his 27th score of the season at 6:49 and attackman Dave Pittard passed to Andrew Collins, who beat Russell 1:21 later. Dingman tied the game at 8:47, before Billy Looney put Navy in front to stay, when he took a pass from Jon Birsner and scored with 5:30 left before halftime.

The Midshipmen increased their lead to 4-2 after Joe Bossi tallied Navy's second extra-man goal of the game just 57 seconds into the third period. Joe Boulukos forced Navy's Brendan Looney to turn over the ball with a big hit with over nine minutes left in the third quarter. The Big Red took advantage of the turnover as Justin Redd fired a pass to Greenhalgh who scored his second of the game at 6:09.

Both defenses were playing superbly by forcing turnovers for the remainder of the third period and the first four minutes of the last quarter. The Midshipmen regained their two-goal margin at 5:29 of the fourth quarter. Dingman forced his way through the Cornell defense and beat McMonagle with a high shot that caught the top of the net for his 34th of the season.

Kevin Nee kept the Big Red in the game when he took a pass from Greenhalgh and outworked the Navy defense to cut the deficit to one goal with 7:33 left to play. Gill brought the ball in from the sideline and bounced a shot past the Cornell goaltender with the game winner 16 seconds later. Collins scored his second of the game to bring Cornell within one goal with 1:57 left in the final quarter, but the Big Red could not score the equalizer.

McMonagle stopped 14 Navy shots for Cornell, which suffered its second one-goal NCAA quarterfinal loss in the past three seasons.

NAVY'S LAST GAME – Junior midfielder Michael Beggins scored his first-collegiate goal just over two minutes into overtime to lead 12th-ranked Navy to an 8-7 victory over Ohio State (0-1). Navy led by four goals early in the second half and held a one-goal lead with 10 seconds to play, but a score by OSU's Kevin Buchanan as time expired sent the game to overtime. Navy opened up a 3-0 lead before the Buckeyes got on the board with a Buchanan goal at 3:52 in the first. The Buckeyes pulled within one with five minutes gone in the second period, but Navy answered with a goal by Joe Lennon. The Midshipmen extended its lead to 6-2 early in the third stanza, but Joel Dalgarno's goal with 10:34 left in the third was the first of four-consecutive Buckeye goals to knot the game at six apiece with 7:18 left in the game. At the 4:20 mark, Clement scored the go-ahead score for the Mids, but coming out of a timeout with less than 30 seconds to go, Navy lost the ball, giving the Buckeyes enough time to set up the game-tying goal. The Mids had six players score its eight tallies including Clement (2-1), Tim Paul (2-0), Nick Mirabito (1-1) and Basil Daratsos (1-1). Additionally, three of the Mids' eight goals were scored on extra-man opportunities (3-of-4). Navy won 12-of-18 face-offs, thanks mostly to an 11-of-16 effort by Mikelis Visgauss.

AT THE HELM — Jeff Tambroni enters his eighth season as head coach of the Big Red after a 2007 campaign in which he saw the program reach a level of success that it hadn't enjoyed in 19 years, as he led the team to its first national semifinal appearance since 1988. With the team's 15-1 record, Tambroni's career record improved to 73-26. His winning percentage of .737 is the second-best among the nine coaches who have served as head coach at Cornell, ahead of the legendary Richie Moran (.680) and behind the all-time leader Ned Harkness (.972).

TAMBRONI AMONG THE BEST — Head coach Jeff Tambroni began the 2007 season ranked seventh in the nation among active Division I coaches in winning percentage, opening the year with a mark of .699. With a 15-1 record during the 2007 season, Tambroni rocketed up to fourth place to open the 2008 season with a .737 winning percentage.

FOR STARTERS - Cornell is 58-50-5 all-time in season openers, including a 5-2 mark during Coach Jeff Tambroni's tenure.

EVERYBODY'S ALL-AMERICAN – Cornell lost four All-Americans from the 2007 squad (Mitch Belisle, Matt McMonagle, David Mitchell, Eric Pittard), but returns four preseason All-Americans for the 2008 campaign – Max Seibald (first-team), John Glynn (second-team), Matt Moyer (third-team) and Danny Nathan (honorable mention).

ELITE COMPANY – Over the past four seasons, Cornell has been among the best in the nation, boasting the second-highest winning percentage of all Division I teams during that span (.793) and ranking third in number of victories (46). Johns Hopkins holds the top spot in both categories with an .823 winning percentage and 51 victories, while Navy edges out the Big Red for second in number of victories with 49.

STRIVE FOR FIVE — Cornell's five consecutive regular season Ivy titles is the longest current stretch by any team in any conference, surpassing Navy, which has won at least a share of four straight Patriot League titles.

ONE FOR THE THUMB — With its victory over Princeton on April 21, 2007 the Big Red claimed at least a share of the Ivy League title for the fifth straight season, the longest stretch since winning 10 straight championships between 1974-83.

OH CAPTAIN, MY CAPTAIN – Cornell's three captains for the 2008 season are seniors John Glynn and Danny Nathan, as well as junior Max Seibald.

CHAMPIONSHIP LINEAGE – Three players currently on the Cornell roster have fathers that have won a national championship with the Big Red – David Lau (George '78), Julian Levine (Jon '76) and Shane O'Neill (John '76). George Lau was a two-time winner as part of both the 1976 and 1977 national championship squads, while Jon Levine and John O'Neill joined him on the 1976 team.

SMARTY PANTS – Cornell has had five CoSIDA Academic At-Large All-Americans (Mitch Belisle '07, Troy Gorman '99 and David Key '01, Matt McMonagle '07 and Casey Stevenson '05), including three during Coach Tambroni's tenure. Unlike other Academic All-America teams in which the selections are all from the same sport, the At-Large men's team is highly competitive as it is comprised of athletes from fencing, golf, gymnastics, ice hockey, lacrosse, rifle, skiing, swimming, tennis, volleyball, water polo and wrestling. To be eligible, a student-athlete must be a varsity starter or key reserve, maintain a cumulative grade point average of 3.20 on a scale of 4.00, have reached sophomore athletic and academic standings at his/her current institution and be nominated by his/her sports information director.

TROPHY HUNTING — Max Seibald was named one of five finalists for the 2007 Tewaaron Trophy, becoming the first Big Red men's lacrosse player to make it to the final five and just the fourth second-year player to earn that distinction, joining Syracuse's Michael Powell (2002), Johns Hopkins' Kyle Harrison (2003) and Duke's Matt Danowski (2005), all of which won the award in their senior seasons.

GROUND BALL GOBBLER – Tommy Schmicker picked up 4.81 ground balls per game last season, good for 19th in the nation.

70 WINS — With the Big Red's 11-8 victory over Brown on April 28, 2007, head coach Jeff Tambroni notched his 70th career win, becoming just the third head coach in Cornell men's lacrosse history to reach that plateau. Tambroni reached the milestone in his 95th career game during his seventh season. The last Big Red coach to reach 70 wins was Richie Moran, who defeated Penn, 15-6, in his seventh season (1975) to achieve a 70-13 record.

HOME IS WHERE THE WINS ARE — During Coach Tambroni's tenure, the Big Red is 39-8 at Schoellkopf Field, including a perfect 7-0 record in 2007 and a 6-0 slate during the 2005 season.

The lone loss during that span came at the hands of the Orange when Syracuse defeated the Big Red 12-11, on April 11, 2006, at Schoellkopf Field.

CLOSE CALLS — Since the beginning of the 2003 season, Cornell is 15-4 in games that have been decided by a single goal, a mark that was raised as the Big Red topped Albany 12-11 in overtime in an NCAA quarterfinal clash. The only blemishes during the stretch were a 6-5 loss to Navy in the 2004 NCAA quarterfinals, a 12-11 loss to Syracuse on April 11, 2006, a 10-9 loss to UMass in the opening round of the NCAA tournament on May 13, 2006 and a 12-11 loss to Duke in the national semifinal on May 26, 2007. Coach Jeff Tambroni is 15-10 in one-goal games during his tenure with the Big Red, including a 4-2 mark in overtime games.

RECAPING 2007 — The 2007 season proved to be one of the greatest in recent years as the Big Red was named the 2007 FieldTurf/NCAA Lacrosse Team of the Year. Cornell capped an undefeated regular season (13-0) with the program's first trip to the national semifinal since the 1988 campaign. The Big Red, the fourth seed in the NCAA tournament, held the top spot in both national polls for the final nine weeks of the season and finished the year with a 15-1 record, one victory shy of the school record (16 in 1976) and eighth all-time in NCAA history for wins in a season. Cornell finished its Ivy League schedule with a perfect 6-0 record, winning its second outright league title in the past four years, garnering at least a share of the conference crown for the past five seasons.

LAST MAN STANDING — Cornell was the last Division I team in the nation to lose a contest in 2007, falling in the national semifinal on May 26. The Big Red amassed a 15-0 record and outlasted Albany, which opened the season at 11-0 before losing to Syracuse on April 20. Division III's Salisbury (23-0) was the only team to finish the season undefeated.

CLEAN YOUR SLATE — Cornell's 11-8 victory over Brown on April 28 gave the Big Red a perfect 6-0 record in the Ivy League for the 15th time in program history. With the 17-4 victory over Hobart, Cornell finished the regular season undefeated for the ninth time in program history and the first time since 1987.

AND THE WINNER IS ... – For the first time since the 1977 season, the Big Red swept the defensive honors given by the United States Intercollegiate Lacrosse Association, as Mitch Belisle '07 earned the Schmeisser Cup as the Outstanding Defenseman in Division I, while Matt McMonagle '07 won the Ensign C.M. Kelly, Jr. Award as the Outstanding Goaltender in Division I. The duo become the second and third players, respectively, to earn USILA awards during Head Coach Jeff Tambroni's tenure, as Joe Boulukos '06 earned the Lt. Donald McLaughlin, Jr. Award as the nation's Outstanding Midfielder in 2006. The unanimous Ivy League Player of the Year, McMonagle became the Big Red's first Kelly Award winner since Dan Mackesey earned the honor in 1977, while Belisle became the first Cornell defenseman to win Schmeisser Cup since Chris Kane (1978).

LEAVE IT TO THE PROFESSIONALS – Five Cornell players were selected in the 2007 Major League Lacrosse Collegiate Draft, including David Mitchell (eighth overall) and Matt McMonagle (10th), who were taken in the first round. Mitch Belisle (12th) was selected in the second round, Brian Clayton (23rd) was taken in the third round and Eric Pittard (44th) was selected in the fifth round. The five Big Red players selected in the 50-player draft were the most in Cornell history, and the most of any school at the 2007 draft, followed by Maryland with four draftees.

FOUR SURE — Cornell has had its share of Final Four appearances in NCAA team competition over the years, as the 2007 men's lacrosse team brought the total of national semifinal appearances to 20.

LAG TIME – Cornell trailed for just 97:05 last season, or an average of just over six minutes per game. The trail time breaks down as follows: Colgate (3-2, 1:16), Notre Dame (1-0, 6:19), Duke (4-2, 25:43), Yale (2-1, 3:18), Penn (1-0, 2:22), Harvard (2-1, 6:38), Dartmouth (1-0, 1:25), Brown (2-1, 11:44), Albany (3-0, 19:42), Duke (10-3, 15:19).

SIX OF ONE, HALF DOZEN OF ANOTHER — When Cornell held Towson to just six goals in its NCAA opening round game, it marked the 10th time during the 2007 season that the Big Red held an opponent to six or less goals.

WINNING IN A ROUT — When Cornell defeated Hobart, 17-4 on May 4, it marked the eighth time during the 2007 season that the Big Red has scored at least 15 goals vs. an opponent, the most since the 1978 squad also scored at least 15 goals against eight different opponents.

POINT BY POINT — During the 2007 season, 24 players scored at least one point, the most since 25 different Big Red players tallied at least one point in 1986.

MONSTERS OF THE MIDFIELD — Last season, the midfield tandem of John Glynn and Max Seibald combined for the most assists by a pair of Cornell midfielders since 1970. Their 42 assists on the year were the most since Justin Redd and Joe Boulukos combined for 35 during

in 2005. Since 1970, only four pairs of pure midfielders have reached the 30 assist plateau – Bob Hendrickson and Craig Jaeger (37 in 1978), Redd and Boulukos (35 in 2005), Glynn and Seibald (42 in 2007) and Bob Shaw and Bill Molloy (30 in 1971).

CONFERENCE WINS — Cornell has won 10 straight Ivy contests, the third-longest stretch in school history behind its NCAA record 39-game streak from 1973-79 and

LOCK DOWN DEFENSE — Cornell finished the 2007 season ranked fifth in the nation in scoring defense, allowing only 7.00 goals per game.

IN THE MARGIN — The Big Red led the nation in scoring margin last season, defeating its opponents by an average of 7.00 goals per game.

IVY OPENERS — When Cornell defeated Yale on March 24, 2007, the Big Red improved to 37-15 all-time in Ivy League openers, including a perfect mark of 7-0 during head coach Jeff Tambroni's tenure. The Richard M. Moran Head Coach of Cornell Lacrosse
 Eighth Season as Head Coach • 11th Season at Cornell
 Hobart '92

Over the span of 10 seasons, one man has been a leading force in Cornell's return to national prominence in lacrosse. The progression is far from over, but head coach Jeff Tambroni is pleased with the journey. After serving as an assistant coach with the Big Red from 1997 to 2000, Tambroni became the second Richard M. Moran Head Coach of Men's Lacrosse in June 2000. The position was endowed in March 2000 by gifts from Cornell lacrosse players and numerous friends of the program.

Tambroni's time with Cornell has been filled with milestones and a resurgence of one of the greatest programs in the history of collegiate lacrosse. The 2007 FieldTurf/NCAA Division I Coach of the Year, Tambroni finished last season ranked fourth among active Division I coaches in winning percentage (.737) and hit the 70-win plateau in the final Ivy League game of the season, defeating Brown, 11-8. He became the third head coach in Cornell men's lacrosse history to reach that mark, and he did it in his 95th game, faster than all but the legendary Richie Moran, who reached the mark in his seventh season (1975) to achieve a 70-13 record. The 2004 *Ithaca Journal* Male Coach of the Year and three-time national Coach of the Week, Tambroni has overseen six consecutive seasons with nine or more wins on East Hill, including three campaigns in which the team achieved 11 victories, and last year, in which Cornell finished with 15 wins.

Last season, the Big Red made its fourth-straight trip to the NCAA tournament, and fifth overall during Tambroni's seven-year career.

During his head-coaching tenure, Tambroni's players have earned 27 first-team All-Ivy honors, including four Ivy League Player of the Year awards and two Rookie of the Year selections. He has also helped his players earn a combined 30 All-America honors, including defender Ryan McClay '03, who

was a four-time All-America selection and earned a spot on the first-team in 2002 and 2003. Under Tambroni's tutelage, Joe Boulukos '06 became the first Big Red player in nearly a decade to win one of the major USILA honors, earning a share of the Lt. Donald McLaughlin Jr. Award as the nation's top midfielder. In 2007, the Big Red swept the defensive honors given by the USILA, as Mitch Belisle '07 earned the Schmeisser Cup as the Outstanding Defenseman in Division I and Matt McMonagle '07 won the Ensign C.M. Kelly, Jr. Award as the Outstanding Goaltender in Division I. That same season, sophomore Max Seibald was named a finalist for the Tewaaraton Trophy, becoming the first Cornell player to earn that distinction.

Tambroni also stresses excellence in the classroom, resulting in seven of his players earning *ESPN The Magazine*/CoSIDA Academic All-District honors, including Casey Stevenson '05, who was named to the 2005 Academic All-America second-team, and Belisle and McMonagle, who earned Academic All-America first-team honors in 2007.

Over the past four seasons, Tambroni has led Cornell to the heights of Division I, boasting the second highest winning percentage of all Division I teams during that span (.793) and ranking third in number of victories (46).

The 2007 season proved to be one of the greatest in recent years as the Big Red capped an undefeated regular season (13-0) with the program's first trip to the national semifinals since the 1988 campaign. Cornell earned the fourth seed in the NCAA tournament after holding the top spot in both national polls for the final nine weeks of the season. The team finished the year with a 15-1 record, one victory shy of the school record (16 in 1976) and eighth all-time in NCAA history for wins in a season. The Big Red finished its Ivy League schedule with a perfect 6-0 record, winning its second outright league title in the past four years and garnering at least a share of the conference crown for the fifth straight year. Cornell's five consecutive regular season Ivy titles is the longest current stretch by any team in any conference. The team was also a perfect 7-0 at home, upping the Big Red's record on Schoellkopf Field to 39-8 during Tambroni's tenure. Cornell finished the year ranked first in scoring offense (14.00 gpg.) and scoring margin (7.00 gpg.) and fifth in scoring defense (7.00 gpg.).

The remarkable 2007 season came on the heels of a 2006 campaign in which the Big Red went 5-1 in the conference, winning a share of its

fourth-straight Ivy League title, the longest stretch since Cornell won 10-straight championships between 1974 and 1983. The Big Red also won 11 games in the regular season for the first time since the 1987 team went into the NCAA tournament with an undefeated record of 11-0. Under Tambroni's guidance, Cornell rose as high as No. 2 in the nation in the March 20 *Inside Lacrosse* media poll, and found themselves among the national leaders in scoring offense, scoring defense, scoring margin, man-up offense and man-down defense.

The 2005 campaign was one of the best in Tambroni's young career as the Big Red went undefeated in Ivy League play and won its first outright Ivy title in nearly 20 years. Cornell finished the regular season with a 10-2 overall record and took a spectacular 12-11 opening round victory over Towson in the NCAA tournament before falling to eventual national runner-up Duke, 11-8. For his efforts,

assisted in all facets of the program, including recruiting and on-field coaching. Tambroni served as the Greyhounds' offensive coordinator, focusing specifically on extra-man situations.

Before moving to Baltimore, Tambroni was an assistant coach at Hobart for three seasons, helping the Statesmen to the 1994 NCAA Division III championship game. He was an assistant as the team made a successful transition to NCAA Division I competition in 1995, finishing the season ranked 12th in the nation.

A former three-time All-American at Hobart College, Tambroni was named first-team All-America as a senior, after scoring 33 goals with 24 assists. He was a second-team All-America selection in 1990 and 1991, as the Statesmen won the NCAA Division III championship. He was named most valuable player of the 1990 championship game when Hobart defeated Washington (Md.) College 18-6. Tambroni had his most productive season in 1990, scoring 69 points on 38 goals and 31 assists. He concluded his college career tied for seventh on Hobart's all-time scoring list with 202 points. He left the Statesmen ranked sixth in assists (99) and 12th in goals (103).

Tambroni graduated in 1992 from Hobart with a bachelor of arts degree in American studies.

Following his graduation, Tambroni, a native of Camillus, N.Y., coached the Heaton Mersey Lacrosse Club of the English Lacrosse Union for one year. He also served as a visiting coach for the Czech-American Lacrosse Foundation in Prague in the summer of 1996. Tambroni was a former high school All-American while playing at West Genesee HS in Camillus.

Tambroni resides in Ithaca with his wife, Michelle, and their daughters, Carissa, Madison and Ella.

Tambroni was honored by being named the co-head coach for the Division I North squad at the 64th annual North-South Classic.

During an emotional 2004 campaign in which the team dealt with the death of a teammate, Tambroni led Cornell to a share of the conference title and earned the Ivy League's automatic bid to the NCAA tournament, where the Big Red came within one goal of the NCAA semifinals for the second time in three seasons.

After leading the Big Red to a 7-6 record and a second-place finish in the Ivy League in his first season as head coach in 2001, he took the program further in 2002, posting an 11-4 record and earning a berth in the NCAA tournament, where Cornell defeated Stony Brook and fell in a tight 11-10 battle with Virginia in the national quarterfinals. The win over Stony Brook marked the Big Red's first NCAA tournament win since 1988. The Ivy championship in 2003 was the program's first since 1987, when the Big Red won it outright. Tambroni has also helped Cornell earn key regular season wins over Syracuse at Schoellkopf Field in 2000 and in 2002, when the Orange lost only twice all season en route to the national championship.

Tambroni joined the Cornell lacrosse staff as an assistant coach in September 1997. Cornell improved in each of his first three years, going from 6-7 in 1998 to 7-6 in 1999 and 10-4 in 2000. The Big Red earned its first berth in the NCAA tournament since 1995 during the 2000 campaign, dropping a hard-fought 14-12 decision to Georgetown in the first round.

Prior to joining the Cornell staff, Tambroni served as assistant coach at Loyola College during the 1997 season, helping guide the Greyhounds to a 10-4 record, as Loyola appeared in its 10th consecutive NCAA tournament. He

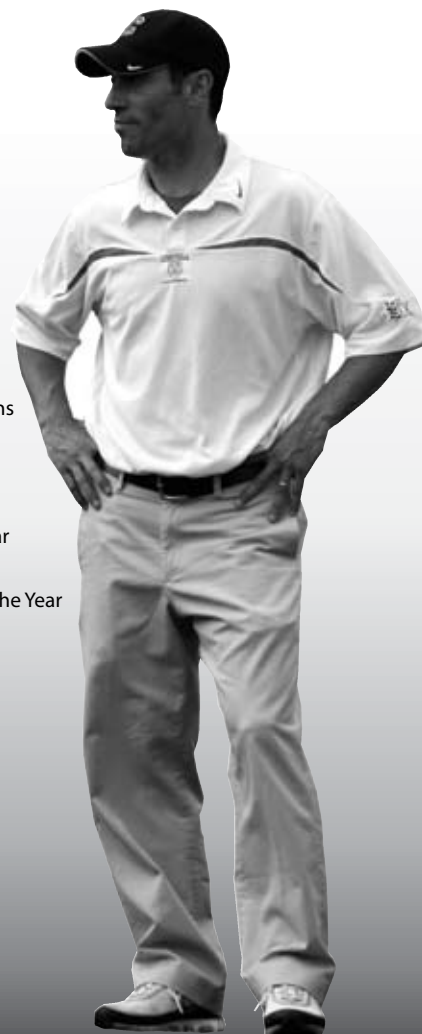
