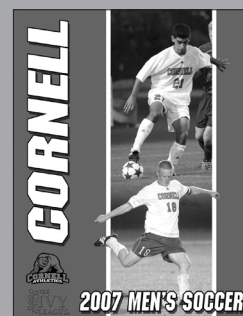
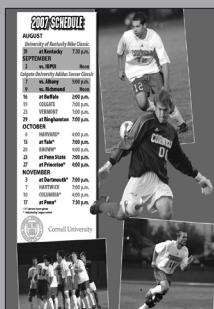

BRYAN SCALES

10th Season At Cornell • Hartwick '91 Men's Soccer Head Coach

As he begins his 10th season at the helm of the Cornell men's soccer program, Bryan Scales continues to build the Big Red into one of the most respected teams in the region and in the Ivy League. He has compiled a 53-76-15 record over his first nine years and has had his teams ranked in the NSCAA/adidas Top 25 in four different seasons.

In 2006, Scales guided the Big Red to a 3-3-1 mark in Ivy League play, good enough for a fourth-place showing in the conference. The finish was the first in the top half of the Ivy League for the Cornell men's soccer program since Scales' second season in 1999, when the squad posted a 5-2-0 mark and was the league runner-up.

The 2001 team finished the year ranked No. 22 nationally with a record of 9-4-3 and Scales was selected by the NSCAA as the 2001 New York Division I Coach of the Year and was named a finalist for the 2001 NSCAA/adidas Division I National Coach of the Year award. The team ended the 2001 season with a six-game unbeaten streak and went 7-2-2 over the final 11 games of the campaign.

In May of 2007, Scales was awarded his Premier Diploma at the NSCAA International Premier Coaching Course in Curitiba, Brazil. This was a comprehensive, eight-day course primarily dealing with the tactical implications of various systems of play. It was hosted and conducted in conjunction with the Brazilian 1st Division club Atletico Paranaense.

Scales has had the privilege of visiting some of Europe's biggest clubs to observe training methods and to speak with coaches. He has spent time at Arsenal, Chelsea, Newcastle and Middlesbrough Football Clubs of the English Premier League, Glasgow Celtic and Rangers of the Scottish Premier League, as well as the legendary Dutch club, Ajax Amsterdam, whom the Big Red competed against on their tour of the Netherlands in 2006.

A 1991 graduate of Hartwick College, Scales, a two-year starter at midfield and defense, helped his team to the 1987 and 1989 NCAA tournaments. His 1989 Hartwick team was the top-ranked team in the New York region and spent much of the season ranked in the top 10 nationally. A four-year letter winner, Scales received his bachelor's degree in political science.

After graduation, Scales served as an assistant coach at SUNY-Plattsburgh before moving on to become an assistant at Harvard University for two years. In 1994, Scales joined the Cornell staff as an assistant coach to then-head coach Dave Sarachan. Scales and Sarachan proceeded to initiate one of the biggest turnarounds in Division I soccer. After a 2-10-3 campaign in 1994, they led the 1995 Big Red to an overall record of 15-2-1 while capturing the Ivy League championship and an automatic NCAA tournament bid. The 1996 team was also awarded an NCAA tournament bid before falling at Rutgers 2-1 in sudden victory OT. When Sarachan left Cornell to join MLS champion DC United after the 1997 season, Scales was named head coach of Cornell soccer in February 1998.

Scales is a native of Medway, Mass., and is a graduate of Newton North High School. He attended the Williston Northampton School as a postgraduate before heading to Hartwick in 1987. Formerly a member of the Region I ODP staff, Scales served as an assistant coach for the region's U-18 team when it competed in tournaments at Lille, France, in 1997 and Hoerden, Ger-



many, in 1999. He has also served as a member of the NSCAA National Rankings Committee.

Scales and his wife, Mindy, reside in Ithaca. They have two sons, Aiden and Jack, and a daughter, Ciara.

One-on-One With Bryan Scales

Q: *What has been your most memorable achievement with the Cornell men's soccer program?*

A: I am very proud of a number of things that we've accomplished over the past nine years. Our 1999 and 2001 teams were two very good groups that were unfortunately left out of the NCAA Tournament on selection day. The fact that we've had a number of players go on to the professional ranks (Adam Skumawitz '01 in Norway, Ted Papadopolous '02 in Greece, Ian Pilarski '03 with the Chicago Fire and Rochester Rhinos, David Mahoney '05 with the Chicago Fire and Scott Palguta '05 with the Rochester Rhinos) is something that speaks to the quality of players we've brought in and how they have developed. I would also be remiss if I didn't mention the amount of alumni support that we have received each and every year. Our fundraising efforts have continued to break records each year — a good sign.

Q: *You decided to "rebuild" the team, in a sense, after the 2004 season, your seventh with the program. Why?*

A: A few different factors made that a difficult season. For the most part, we were solid defensively, but we struggled to score goals. Consequently, we couldn't get the results that we needed — especially when we played well in tight games — to give ourselves a boost. The chemistry of the team suffered and some of the decisions that were made, both on and off the field, by our young players were not what we expect out of a Cornell soccer player. I knew that after the season I was going to need to make some significant changes to our player pool and how we conduct business, from top to bottom, in order to represent the Cornell soccer "brand" the right way. History tells us that these seasons happen from time to time. You just have to continue to work hard to drive the group in the right direction.

Q: *Are you pleased with the team's progress following that decision?*

A: Understandably, we've had our ups and downs, but the graph has been consistently moving up as far as the quality of our performances and the results. This is an evolution, not a revolution. We have to recruit good young players and develop them. Be patient, but driven. So far, I am pleased with the progress we've made over the last two years on a number of fronts. Our expectations as a program continue to grow each year. Ultimately, we want to win the Ivy League championship.

Q: *Where do you feel the program is along your plan of rebuilding the program?*

A: Last year, we had one of the top defenses in the league. We also scored more goals than in previous seasons. For us to contend for a championship, we'll need to continue to increase our goal-scoring output as well as be very stingy defensively. The Ivy League is one of the top five leagues in the country. It is extremely competitive. We must be solid on both sides of the ball (defensively and offensively) to challenge for a trophy. The players know this and are committed to it every day.

Q: *What is the next step in the plan, and what will it take to get to that point?*

A: This is a special place. Finding quality student-athletes with the right character, letting them know the value of Cornell University and, in particular, the quality of the experience they'll have as a member of the Cornell soccer family is of paramount importance. That, coupled with hard work on the training ground, will eventually get us where we want to be. We are very excited about the future of the program.

Q: *You've spent a great deal of time traveling and learning from professional clubs across the globe. What have you learned in those experiences that you try to carry over to the Cornell program?*

A: The experience of being on the inside of a professional club on a daily basis is always very interesting. You are always looking to pick up new things. There are so many different ways to train players and put together teams, but the bottom line is that players need to be challenged in good training sessions each day to get better. We are always looking for opportunities to impress upon our players the need to be professional in their approach to the game. And while the style or approach to training may be different from country to country, the game still remains constant in its simplicity. You have to be able to pass and move.



JOE SCHNECK

Second Season At Cornell • College of New Jersey '04 Men's Soccer Assistant Coach

Joe Schneck is in his second season as an assistant coach with the Cornell men's soccer program. Schneck served as an interim assistant coach during the 2006 season before being named to the position full-time in December of 2006. The Mt. Laurel, N.J., native is a 2004 graduate of The College of New Jersey.

Schneck spent the 2005 season as a graduate assistant coach at his alma mater while he pursued his master's degree in athletic administration at the institution.

A four-year letterman with the Lions, Schneck earned several honors as a member of the men's soccer team at TCNJ. As a

senior, he earned a spot on the 2003 National Soccer Coaches Association of America (NSCAA) — Adidas Metro Regional All-America honorable mention team.

Also a CoSIDA Academic All-District II College Division second team honoree, Schneck was the Lions' co-captain during his senior season and collected 49 points in 74 games played on 17 goals and 15 assists. A Dean's List Student, he was also a four-time TCNJ scholar-athlete and the 2004 recipient of the Dr. Harold Eickhoff Outstanding Senior Scholar-Athlete Award as the top senior male scholar-athlete.

NENAD ZIGANTE

Fifth Season At Cornell • Zagreb '86 Men's Soccer Volunteer Assistant Coach

Nenad "Ziggy" Zigante, a former assistant coach for the San Jose Clash of the MLS, enters his fifth season as an assistant on the Big Red coaching staff. An accomplished goalkeeper and private trainer on both the professional and collegiate levels worldwide, Zigante has been a national director of the Soccer Plus Goalkeeping Schools since 1995.

Zigante's impact on Cornell's goaltending corps was impressive in 2003, as he was instrumental in helping David Mahoney '04 become an All-Ivy goaltender in his first season in a Big Red uniform and the team's save percentage was the second highest in the league behind Ivy champion Brown. Last season, he guided Luca Cerretani to rankings in the top 50 in the nation in both save percentage (44th, .810) and goals against average (42nd, 0.861)

He served as an assistant for the San Diego Sockers of the CISL from 1995-98 before catching on with the Clash. During that time, he also lent his netminding expertise to the staffs at the University of San Diego, Cal-San Bernardino and Mesa College. In 1994, Zigante was a guest clinician for the U.S. men's national and Olympic teams and was a coach in the Japan Women's Soccer League the previous year.

Beginning in 1992, Zigante spent time as a goalkeeper coach for various club programs throughout California, helping the Cal-South under-16 girls' team earn a national championship along the way.

Zigante earned dual degrees in physical education and economics from the University of Zagreb in his native Croatia in

1986. He earned his UEFA referee certificate shortly after graduation and has held a U.S. Soccer Federation referee certification and 'C' coaching license since 1993.

A former all-star goalkeeper for the Wichita Wings of the Major Indoor Soccer League, Zigante left professional play in 1990. Since concentrating on coaching, he has consistently placed players with college and professional programs both in the U.S. and overseas.

Zigante and his wife, Gretchen, reside in Ithaca with their children, Susana and Mario.

PATRICK OUCKAMA

First Season At Cornell • Ithaca '05 Men's Soccer Volunteer Assistant Coach

Patrick Ouckama joins the Cornell men's soccer program as an assistant coach for the 2007 season. Ouckama currently plays with the Baltimore Blast of the Major Indoor Soccer League.

Ouckama played collegiately at Ithaca College, where he was a two-time first-team All-Empire 8 selection in addition to earning second-team honors once. He was also named first-team all-Northeast Region twice, in both 2003 and 2004, and earned second-team all-region honors in 2002.

Ouckama, a defender during his time at Ithaca College, played in 11 games last season for the Baltimore Blast, recording six blocked shots during the year.

Ouckama is a 2000 graduate of Ithaca High School where he played soccer and ice hockey. He graduated from Ithaca College in 2005 with a degree in journalism.

2007 Cornell Men’s Soccer Outlook

With 16 juniors and seniors on the roster, a veteran team has been assembled for the the 2007 men's soccer season. After finishing out the 2006 campaign strong, with wins in the final two matches to seal the first finish in the top half of the Ivy League since 1999, the Big Red are set to progress a step further and challenge for an Ivy League crown.

“All of us associated with the program are very much looking forward to the 2007 season,” said head coach Bryan Scales. “We feel as though we have a number of pieces in place to compete with the top teams in our league and nationally. Our goal is to challenge for an Ivy League championship. The players have worked very hard to put themselves in this position and we look forward to the challenge that lies ahead.”

Along with the large number of upperclassmen, the Big Red also returns nine starters from a year ago, providing a level of continuity that will help Cornell to be a dangerous squad both in the region and in the Ivy League.

Goalkeeping

The depth of the squad is evident in front of the nets, as Cornell has four goalkeepers, each of whom has the ability to step into the lineup at any given time. Junior Luca Cerretani returns to try to hold on to the starting job after posting honorable mention All-Ivy League honors a year ago. Cerretani finished the 2006 season ranked in the top 50 in the nation in both save percentage and goals against average, while also collecting four shutouts.

Fellow junior Steve Lesser will push Cerretani as he tries to return to the lineup. Lesser had started all 15 games as a freshman in 2005, but was overtaken by Cerretani early last season. Another returnee, sophomore Peter Franz, saw valuable time in practice last season as the number three goalkeeper and will also challenge for the backup spot this season.

Freshman Scott Brody also enters the mix in his first season on the East Hill. Brody was a second-team all-state honoree last season in New Jersey, and will also compete for playing time in a deep goalkeeping corps.

Defense

Returning to anchor the back line is senior Kyle Lynch, a two-year captain and two-time All-Ivy League selection. Lynch has started 37 of the 38 games he has appeared in during his career and will again be called upon to provide leadership to what has traditionally been a very stingy defense.

A trio of juniors, Dan McKallagat, Kevin Vieira and Joe Yonga, will also provide leadership to the young group of defensemen. McKallagat played in 12 games last year, starting nine, while Vieira appeared in 14 of the 15 contests, making eight starts. Yonga is a versatile athlete who can play anywhere on the field, but earned all-league honors last season while playing primarily on defense. Yonga was one of only three players to appear and start in all 15 games last season. Sophomore Matt Devitt saw time in eight contests as a freshman and will likely see his role expand as well.

In addition to the four returning players, a quartet of newcomers to the squad will also fight to break into the regular rotation on defense. Craig Dimpleby, Brian Donovan, Adam Hardie and Shane Merriman will each have an opportunity to earn valuable minutes while building toward the future.

Midfield

The Big Red is deeper and more experienced in the midfield than at any other position on the pitch. Five seniors will provide leadership and help to ease the transition for several young faces, while also bol-

stering the attack and helping in the defensive third.

Of the five seniors, Brian Kuritzky and tri-captain Aaron Vieira were the biggest contributors a year ago and will likely be called upon again to maintain possession in the center of the park. Kuritzky appeared in all 15 games last season, making 14 starts, and tallied a goal and a pair of assists. Vieira missed several games due to injury, but still was able to play in 10 games, starting five of them. Classmate Bob Putko appeared in six games a year ago and will try to expand on his role in his third season at Cornell.

Senior Jarid Siegel missed all of the 2006 season due to injury, and unfortunately suffered another while trying to come back, making it unlikely he will be able to contribute in 2007. Still, he will provide valuable leadership, having been named one of the team's tri-captains. The fifth senior, Sean Mooney, returns to the club for his final season after missing the 2006 campaign. He played in nine games in his first two seasons, and will also look to play an expanded role this season.

Three juniors should provide Coach Scales with multiple options in the midfield. Miyad Movassaghi saw the most time of the three a year ago after transferring in from American University, where he spent his freshman season. Movassaghi played in 10 games last year, collecting a pair of assists to tie him with Kuritzky for the team high. Marcelo Guindon and Ed Chang will also work to break into the regular rotation in the midfield, as both players saw limited time a year ago.

A trio of freshmen will work to earn playing time, as Scott Caldwell, Matt Stengel and Will

Wolfson each bring impressive club and high school credentials to the roster.

Forward

Up front, Cornell has several players who have shown the ability to put the ball in the back of the net, yet Coach Scales is still looking for that consistent, reliable goalscorer. Juniors David Browning and Dana Flanders have two goals and an assist between the two of them, while Flanders also has the ability to play on defense if needed. The pair have played in 46 games combined since arriving on campus.

A pair of sophomores showed flashes of brilliance last season and will get another crack at becoming the main option up top this season. J.J. Bain scored a goal in his first collegiate start last season to give Cornell a tie against No. 17 Boston University, while Matt Bouraee came on strong at the end of the year, scoring goals against Yale and Princeton to earn honorable mention All-Ivy League honors.

Freshmen Brett Sumpio and Jeff Zimering need not look any farther than Bain and Bouraee to get an example of how a freshman can make an impact. The pair come into Cornell with exeptional high school and club credentials and will try to break into the lineup in their first seasons in the Carnelian Red and White.

The Schedule

Six home games highlight the 2007 schedule, as Cornell will also face five in-state non-conference opponents this season. The Big Red will also take on perennial powers Kentucky and Penn State on the road, with the game against Kentucky coming in the season opener at the UK NIKE Classic. The Big Red opens the home slate on Sept. 19 against Colgate, before taking on Vermont four days later. Cornell opens Ivy League play on Oct. 6 at home against Harvard. In all, the Big Red will face three Ivy League foes at Berman Field this season.
